CHANGE OF LITURGICAL SEASONS

Advent is a season of the <u>liturgical year</u> observed in most <u>Christian denominations</u> as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for both the celebration of the <u>Nativity of Christ</u> at <u>Christmas</u> and the return of Christ at the <u>Second Coming</u>. Advent is the beginning of the <u>liturgical year</u> in <u>Western Christianity</u>. The term "Advent" is also used in <u>Eastern Orthodoxy</u> for the 40-day <u>Nativity Fast</u>, which has practices different from those in the West. The term is adopted from Latin word *adventus*, meaning "coming; arrival", translated from the <u>Greek parousia</u>, which in the <u>New Testament</u> is the term used for the <u>Second Coming of Christ</u>. The four weeks of Advent are often marked by a set of so-called Advent candles, lit each week to mark the progress towards the coming Kingdom of Heaven. Advent was traditionally a penitential season, like Lent, often made visible with purple vestments, dire scriptural readings, forbidden use of the Gloria, and traditional sermon topics on death, last judgment, heaven and hell! Traditions change though, and more and more these days, Advent is viewed as a season of 'preparation,' not penitence, for the coming of the Christ, often made visible now with vestments or candles of blue, though liturgical colors are never mentioned in the American Prayer Books, and are simply local customs.
