



Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Celebrant Let us pray.

O God, who before the passion of your only begotten Son revealed his glory upon the holy mountain: Grant to us that we, beholding by faith the light of his countenance, may be strengthened to bear our cross, and be changed into his likeness from glory to glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

The Readings

INTRODUCTION: In this reading from the Hebrew Scriptures, we learn how Moses' face shone after he had spoken with the Lord.


A Reading from the Scroll of Exodus (34:29-35)

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterward all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

INTRODUCTION: In this New Testament reading St. Paul celebrates the freedom and boldness that comes to believers through Christ.


A Reading from Second Epistle of St. Paul to the Corinthians (3:12-4:2)


Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the

end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit. Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

INTRODUCTION: Our Gospel reading is the story of Jesus's transfiguration on the mountain.

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to St. Luke (9:28-36)

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"--not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

The Prayers of the People

Christ appeared to the apostles in the brilliance of heavenly light. Let us pray that his glory may illumine our hearts, as we offer our prayers, responding, "Hear us, O God of glory."

The congregation may wish to sit or kneel for the prayers

+ That we may be receptive to the power of the Divine Word to transform our lives, reorder our thoughts, give us truer vision, and deepen our desire for God's truth; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

+ That we may find in law and prophecy the inheritance of our ancestors, and the freedom to move from the mountaintops of our experience into the marketplace of daily life; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

+ That as our faith increases, our thoughts and actions may reflect interior transfiguration, and our charity be extended to the poor, the hungry, the outcast, and all for whom our Lord Christ came to give his life; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

+ That God's loving embrace may uphold and sustain those we hold in our thoughts, especially all who have commended themselves to our prayers; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

+ In thanksgiving for our common journey in the faith, that we who have received the Word made flesh may embark on the holy road of Lent, and rejoice together in the Paschal mystery to come; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

+ In thanksgiving for the Body of Christ, and the Cup of Salvation; may it be for us a foretaste of Christ's heavenly banquet which the faithful departed now enjoy; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

+ That Shaun, our Presiding Bishop, Jeff & Laura, Bishops of this diocese, and all who exercise episcopal oversight may live into their office as chief pastors, teachers, and celebrants of the sacraments; for this we pray.

Hear us, O God of glory.

May the light of Christ be revealed through us, as we continue our prayers, either silently or aloud.

The Celebrant adds a concluding Collect.

O God of peace, who hast taught us that in returning and rest we shall be saved, in quietness and in confidence shall be our strength: By the might of thy Spirit lift us, we pray thee, to thy presence, where we may be still and know that thou art God; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Confession of Sin

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

The congregation may wish to sit or kneel for the confession

Most merciful God,
we confess that we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done,
and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,
have mercy on us and forgive us;
that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Priest, stands and says

May the Almighty and merciful Lord grant you absolution and remission of all your sins, but also time for true repentance, amendment of life, and the grace and consolation of his Holy Spirit. *Amen*.

The Peace

The Celebrant says to the people

The peace of God be always with you.

People And also with you.

Then the Ministers and People may greet one another in the name of the Lord.

The Holy Communion

The Celebrant may begin the Offertory with one of the sentences of Scripture.

Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself for us, an offering and sacrifice to God. *Ephesians 5:2*.

Then the Celebrant continues

we would not see your goodness in the world around us;

Yet you never ceased to care for us,

and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you.

You delivered us from slavery,

sustained us in the wilderness,

and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation.

Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word,

made mortal flesh in Jesus.

Born into the human family,

and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory.

Giving himself freely to death on the cross,

he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

of your daughters and sons,

that with the Ever-Blessed Virgin Mary, St. John, our Patron, and all your saints, past, present, and yet to come,

we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. AMEN.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven,

hallowed be thy Name,

thy kingdom come,

thy will be done,

on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those

who trespass against us.


And lead us not into temptation,


O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant us thy peace.

Facing the people, the Celebrant says the following Invitation.

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All baptized Christians of all ages and denominations are welcome to receive Communion in this place. This is God's house and the Lord's table, not ours

INSTRUCTIONS: Those wishing to receive Communion should come forward to the Altar rail as directed. Please speak with an Usher if you need to receive Communion in the pew. The consecrated host will be placed in the hands or upon the tongue of the recipient, as desired. If one wishes intinction, then either the chalice bearer or the communicant may take the host and dip it in the wine. Otherwise, communicants may sip from the chalice, assisting by taking hold of its base. If the communicant does not wish to receive the wine, one can simply cross their arms across their chest after receiving the bread so to indicate.




Let us pray.
